#### **Dear Friends**

I write after a busy day traversing the narrow lanes of Cornwall in my quest to visit all the churches in the Celtic Quiet Places scheme, which number over 100. One of my Rustington Methodist friends asked before I came away if I was going 'fonting' which greatly amused me. So, a new word is born which I have happily adopted!!

I was indeed setting off to look at more baptismal fonts. Curiously, although I have now seen over eighty of them, even though many are similar I don't believe any have been identical to each other. Hard to estimate, let alone imagine, how many infants have been baptized over hundreds of years in these various vessels. Looking at baptismal fonts, in mainly ancient buildings, does set you thinking about the hopes and fears that surrounded those who were presented for baptism. Of course, in years past infant mortality was of necessity a greater matter of

Bull Keep out concern than it generally is today.

Much 'belief' around infant baptism has been in the nature of superstition. I well remember a minister I worked with years ago pointing out at every baptism he conducted that, 'God will not love little Johnny any more on the way out than he did on the way in.' Yet, just as the birth of a child is filled with potential and anticipation of what might be, so should the first steps we make in matters of faith hold such

#### promise.

On the last church visit of the day I parked by the back of the church. As I got out of the car I glanced to the rear of the car and contemplated the sight before me. A public footpath sign and a warning notice for the route indicated. I wonder if this isn't a metaphor for our faltering steps to

follow Jesus. We know that we want to follow but all kinds of fears and uncertainties overwhelm us.

Some of our fears are legitimate, rather like the potential danger of a raging bull which might should deter us setting out on what should be a right of way. Other objections to following the way like 'the grass might be wet' could be overcome by proper preparation. Then there's the protest. 'I don't know where this path leads' which invites us to have more faith. Misplaced lack of confidence is an anxiety that many of us fall foul to.

So, how are you fulfilling the potential of your baptism, and can you discern those fears and that lack of confidence which can be overcome, so that together we may follow Christ's way more closely.

The prophet Isaiah conveyed God's message for the people then, and for us:

Fear not for I am with you

Be not dismayed for I am your God

I will strengthen you, I will help you.

I will uphold you with my righteous right hand.

Isaiah 41: 10



Sadly, she now feels that her gardening days are proving too much physically, but she will always be welcome to join us with advice.



#### The Prayer Course – Lord, teach us to pray

Following my article on prayer earlier this year, a small group of us have been meeting together and studying this course. It is a free resource provided by the 24-7 Prayer team and follows the same format for each of its eight sessions — with a video to watch where Pete Grieg discusses an aspect of prayer with a friend, followed by some questions to consider as a small group and an opportunity to put into practise some of the prayer ideas. The course is based around The Lord's Prayer with topics linking into a different aspect each week. We have thought about:

Why we pray – Lord teach us to pray

Adoration – Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name

Petition – Give us this day our daily bread

Intercession – Your kingdom come

Unanswered Prayer – Your will be done

Contemplation – On earth as it is in heaven

Listening – Give us this day our daily bread (in another sense)

Spiritual Warfare – Deliver us from evil

We have found it interesting and thought provoking, helpful and very often challenging. The intimacy of our small group has enabled us to share honestly, including areas where we struggle, and it's been wonderful to learn that we are not alone and others have the same struggles too! We all feel very thankful to have had the opportunity to meet and ponder these things together and have decided to keep meeting, perhaps doing the follow-on course in the autumn.



On 3<sup>rd</sup> August we looked at Luke 11: 1-13, in our morning worship, where Jesus teaches the disciples to pray with the words which are so familiar to us...

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name.

Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses,

as we forgive those that trespass against us.

Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil:

for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory,

forever and ever. Amen.

## Bangers & Mash Held on Saturday July 5th


Seven of us decided to get together to try and raise some money towards the

to make the day run smoothly. Most of us were


novices where food preparing was concerned, but thankfully others knew how to organise the rest!

this is likely to remain unless giving by the congregation increases. It was noted that some of our members are very generous, and we are aware that others, who might like to give more, are unable to do so. There was some discussion about how to resolve this problem. Suggested that perhaps letters could go out to everyone – this to be taken to Property and Finance in September. Conversation about charging for coffee on a Sunday, rather than requesting donations, was firmly rejected as it is part of our hospitality.

**Budget** for year Sept 2025 – August 2026 was approved

**Independent Examiner**. Neat Accounting Ltd appointed.

#### **PROJECTS**:

The Audio Visual and PA upgraded system has cost £16,637. Grants received of £5,500 from Circuit and £1,000 from District. The shortfall has been drawn down from reserves as previously agreed.

#### Hall Kitchen Refurbishment.

**The fundraising** has gone well. The total of fundraising from Gift Day and Gift Aid, and special events has now reached £12,000.

It was agreed that £3,000 received following the deaths of three people be put towards the Kitchen Fund, which makes a total to date of £15,000.

**The anticipated total cost** for the kitchen will be in the region of £16,500. This excludes the glossing of doors etc. Fundraising still needed £1,500.

Special thanks were expressed to Bob and Elizabeth, Dave and Derek for their practical work on the kitchen and to Damian our Electrician who has been very generous with his time.

It was noted that the special fundraising events had brought different people from the church and community together, as the LYCIG events had last year. All these events have had a great family atmosphere, but the fact that recent events had been organised by different people had been very beneficial. The desire for more social events was noted.

**Lay Workers**. Methodist recommend increase of 3.06% for coming year. Agreed.

Brigette has approached us about reducing her hours by dropping a day. Agreed that Bob and Rosemarie liaise with her to outline a new job description and determine the work she will no longer do. Agreed that it must be emphasised to the congregation that she is not an administrator.

All the outstanding items from the Quinquennial inspection had been completed. There is a great team of gardeners working to keep things tidy. Kathleen has decided to step down from gardening.

Rev Dawn Carn has been approached about delaying her retirement for a year to Aug 2027. Offington Park have decided to seek a Lay Pioneer Missioner rather than a deacon.

		Consequently, the circuit will be seeking one minister through the stationing process to have pastoral charge of Goring, Steyning and Storrington and co-ordinate Circuit Youth Work. However, these stationing challenges will resurface next year.  Rev Owen Carney – probationer presbyter is to join the circuit in September, serving Lancing, Shoreham and Southwick Rev Conrad Hicks becomes the District Chair from Sept.  Bognor Regis: Major works are needed to the premises and they do not have the funds to do this.  Tarring Road. Circuit are looking for a new tenant. It is therefore rather challenging looking at the funding going forward.
