Dear Friends

I am writing this in the run up to Christmas, but by the time you read it we will all be settling into a new year. It is likely that New Year resolutions will have been enthusiastically made and possibly already broken, and world events will be just as concerning as they were a month ago. However, we must not be lulled into a false sense of security that infers it's 'business as usual'. I am painfully aware that this may be the most important Link letter that I have ever written, and I dearly wish that I did not feel compelled to share the words that follow.

I hear from my colleagues across the South East District of alarming events fostering racism in their communities and churches. The success of the far-right in provoking this distress should be of concern to us all. The campaign which claimed to be putting Christ back into Christmas was spearheaded by far-right campaigners and heavily financed from beyond these shores. As one Christian commentator put it, 'we do not control Jesus Christ and he is not ours to put anywhere.... his call to us is... to listen and follow.'

Whilst we might all wish for 'Christ' to become a more central part of the Christmas celebrated in Britain, others may hold different ideas from us of what this means. Surely it must hinge on what we understand of the personhood and values of the Christ we proclaim, and the life he calls us to follow. The question for us must be whether the Jesus we know is recognisable in what is being allegedly reclaimed.

We see again and again in Scripture that God is near to those experiencing lowliness; he loves the lost, the neglected, the unseemly, the excluded, the weak and broken, the hated. Alongside that we note that the biblical law tells God's people to treat the stranger in their land as one of their own, and the Biblical prophets rail against rulers who oppress the poor and mistreat people. So, how does that (and should that) inform our attitude to refugees and asylum seekers, the homeless and those experiencing poverty to name but a few groups who are persecuted by some in our society?

Each Christmas we hear again the message of the angel to the lowly shepherds out on the hillside. 'Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people.' Good news for all people – not this group, that group or the other group, but for all.

John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist tradition, himself considered what it might mean to live in a Christian country. In his characteristically forthright way, he challenged his hearers:

"Where do the Christians live? Where is the country where everyone is filled with the Holy Spirit? Where they never let anyone go without anything but always give to everyone according to their need? Who are all filled with the love of God? Who are all merciful, humble, gentle and patient? Who never do anything against justice, mercy or truth but always do to others as they would have them do to them? How can we call anything a Christian country that doesn't look like this? Let's be honest: we've never seen a Christian country on earth." (John Wesley, Scriptural Christianity, paraphrased by Revd Dr Mark Rowland)

I don't see this as a political issue but one that is essential to the future of Christianity in this country. There are many examples in history where Christianity has lost its way for a period. We might consider the way in which slavery was condoned, apartheid supported or the cruelty of the workhouse – all things which now appal us. Things which we can hardly believe were actively endorsed by people who claimed to have a Christian faith.

Just after the Holocaust Martin Niemöller penned these lines, arguing against apathy—and for the moral connectedness of all people.

First they came for the Socialists, and I did not speak out— Because I was not a Socialist. Then they came for the Trade Unionists, and I did not speak out— Because I was not a Trade Unionist. Then they came for the Jews, and I did not speak out— Because I was not a Jew. Then they came for me—and there was no one left to speak for me.

This may not be the cheery new year message that you expected to read here, or you may think that Christmas is past for another year and these words are irrelevant as we move into 2026, with another Christmas months away. However, I share them with you now because I believe that we need to resolve this year to set aside our usual complacency, and not sleep through the efforts of others to distort the Christian message for their own ends. We must be alert. We should not stand by and allow the wonderful message of the gospel of Jesus to be reinterpreted: in support of the rhetoric of the far-right (or any group for that matter), to marginalise any group of people, or to spread hate and division rather than love and compassion.

The ‘Big Church Festival’



In late August, I got the opportunity to work at Big Church Festival, on the main stage, doing audio engineering. Big Church Festival is a Christian music festival that happens every year at Wiston House in the South Downs, which around 35,000 people attend. My family and I have been to it almost every year since it began in 2009, and it has become a really special place for me, and a great foundation in my walk with Jesus.

So when I got an email offering me a place to work there, on the main stage no less, I really couldn't turn it down. I had a lot of nerves going into it, especially because I only had a week between receiving the email and actually going!



What happened over the 5 days that I was there was so surreal. I got there a day before it all started. I got to see all of the setup, and got involved with helping the tech crew set up bits and bobs. I got shown my role, and where I was going to be based. I got given some microphones and other tech to be in charge of, and, most exciting of all, a headset for communications with the tech crew and the

content team! I also set up my tent in the volunteer camping section, where I slept for each of the 4 nights I was there.

A great benefit of being on the team was the free meals - a cooked breakfast every morning, and then a variety of amazing choices for lunch and dinner throughout the days. It was such good food! And, during meals, it was great to talk to different people who were also on the team.



During each of the three festival days, I was responsible for providing mics and sound for the acts and presenters in the changeovers between the sets on main stage. My station was side stage, so I had a front row seat for any sets I wanted to see! Other than that, I could relax backstage and prepare for the next changeover with the presenters and content team. Our dressing room was next to all the artists' dressing rooms, so I got to see and meet a lot of cool people, who are relatively famous in the Christian music world! I did also get to spend some time with my family during longer sets which was nice.

It was a tiring three days of action, but I enjoyed it all. It was a fantastic experience. To see how everything works behind the scenes was so interesting, and it was definitely an experience that I won't forget! All the people I met were so lovely, and there was a real sense of God's presence running through everything that happened, even through the chaos!



After it finished, I got told that the team would love me back next year, so I will definitely consider doing it again!

Helping people get control of their finances, save, and prevent debt, and is run in partnership with local churches across the UK. **Free and Accessible**, all CAP services are completely free, funded by donations. You do not need to be a Christian to participate; the courses are inclusive and open to people of all faiths and backgrounds. **Practical Skills**, running over four sessions, it uses a simple, cash-based system to help participants build and balance a household budget, structure finances, find ways to save, and use credit wisely. **Expert Guidance**, sessions involving a mixture of videos featuring financial specialists, activities, and discussions, with support from trained CAP Money Coaches. **Ongoing Support** is important and participants gain unlimited access to a mobile-friendly budget worksheet and online budgeting tools.




Christingles

Renewing the Covenant 2026, and the minority report

'Be strong and very courageous. Be careful to obey all the laws my servant Moses gave you; do not turn from it to the right or the left, that you may be successful wherever you go.' (Joshua 1: 1-7)

These were the instructions given by God to Joshua as he led the Israelites into the Promised Land. This story really begins in the account narrated in Numbers 13 and 14, of the 12 spies who went on a *reccy* to suss out this land which the Lord had promised to them. A land flowing with milk and honey it might have been, but ten of the twelve were fearful of the fortified cities and the power of the people who they described as 'like giants'. The minority report of Joshua and Caleb acknowledged all that the other ten had said but their confidence in God being stronger than any situation or group of people meant that rather than retreat they were ready to go ahead into the land promised to them.

However, it was not the minority report that won the day as a result of which the children of God wandered in the desert for another 39 years and none of that generation, other than Caleb and Joshua lived to enter the Promised Land.

What happened was really just a matter of perspective...same facts different conclusion but what far reaching effect the resulting actions were to have.

A covenant is serious binding agreement between two or more parties. It goes beyond an ordinary contract because it carries a sense of commitment, loyalty and moral responsibility, not just legal obligation. In Christian theology, a covenant is a sacred binding agreement initiated by God that establishes a relationship with his people. It is God's covenant with the Israelites which is the background to the promise in Joshua.

If the spies came to vastly different conclusions the church has been doing the same ever since.

Does our view of the world view cause us to be cast down when we hear the news, feeling it's all out of control and there is no hope? Or with the eyes of faith do we think, 'terrible though this is God is still the Sovereign Lord of all and will one day bring all things under his hand'?

Does our view of the church make us depressed by the continual numerical decline, or do we with all its faults and failings still believe the church can be different?

Does our personal view lead us to be fearful, weary, spiritually drifting, clinging to old hurts, resisting God or can we face our own inadequacies and be courageous in God?

Being courageous in God means we can face ourselves, trust in God's promises, and find the strength to obey and renew the Covenant. In renewing the Covenant we are simply saying, Lord, I am yours – whatever the future holds whether easy or hard, whether the church grows or shrinks, whether the world becomes calmer or more chaotic, whether my circumstances are joyful or painful I belong to you, use me as you will.

Shall we listen to the majority report – the voice of fear, decline and despair or sign up to the minority report- the voice of faith, promise and obedience? As the people entered the Promised Land, Joshua's message to them was this: '*Consecrate yourselves for tomorrow the Lord will do amazing things among you.*' (Joshua 3: 5) As we renew our Covenant with God this year let us keep that promise in mind.

The Friendship Singers



Thank you to everyone who came to our Christmas Concert on 2 December. We enjoyed the afternoon singing, with you joining in carols too, and we were able to give £338.47 (donated as a result of the concert) to St Barnabas House, our chosen charity. We have two main concerts a year, in the summer and at Christmas. There is no admission charge, with donations invited for our chosen charity.

I thought I'd give a little background of our choir, as some of you will not be familiar with it. We were founded in the 1970's as one of the activities provided by Mod Mums Coffee Club, as it was known then, when we sang together for fun in the home of one of the members. Later, most of us, who had continued to sing in the choir, realised that perhaps the term "Mod Mums' Choir" didn't fit for us any more so we took a vote on a name and agreed on The Friendship Singers. This is an excellent name because our choir is all about friendship, to each other, the church and the wider community. (Two of the original members are still in the choir!)

We continued with a goodly number of singers and were asked to sing at various events, church concerts, nursing homes etc, including the Parish Council's Christmas Concert each year.

Then, Covid hit! We had over 18 months without singing together and when we tentatively returned, our numbers had dropped drastically with members deciding to retire from singing for one reason or another. Should we continue? We were determined to try as we enjoyed singing (so good for one's health as promoted by Gareth Malone!) and placed advertisements for new members.

Our first "return" concert was December 2022 to support the people of Ukraine at Christmas which included Christmas carols for the audience to sing as it had not been possible for some time. Since then we have gradually built up numbers so that the choir is viable again and our aim is to enjoy singing and support charities.

Since that concert in 2022 we have supported Turning Tides Homeless Project, Safe in Sussex (supporting people experiencing domestic abuse), The Chestnut Tree Children's Hospice, The Community Fridge, our own Church kitchen project and of course St Barnabas.

We are very fortunate to have Ann Waters as our pianist and recently Sarah Easton has taken over as Conductor as our previous conductor, Terry Warren, retired due to ill health. Sarah has brought a new vitality to the choir and I've asked Sarah to write a few words.....

"I joined the Friendship Singers 3 years ago as an alto, with minimal experience of conducting a community band - but I can count to 4 and wave my arms! I am very honoured to be the current conductor and hope to build on the focus of friendship through singing."

Held, Monday 1st December 2025 at 7:30pm

12 members of the Council were present and apologies were received from seven.

3	Membership	Marian C tendered her resignation to the Council as Church Representative.
5	Minutes of previous meeting	With one amendment, the minutes were agreed as a true and accurate record and signed by Rev Rosemarie.
8	Safeguarding	Necessary DBS checks and training needs were reviewed
9	Pastoral	Sally Sampey has died – meeting stood to remember her.
10	Finance report	Hall Kitchen Refurbishment. The shortfall of £3,768 has been reduced by around £300 following the Christmas Fayre Accounts for the year September 2024 to August 2025 were agreed Lay Workers Consequential increases to rates of pay were agreed following the Government increase to the Living Wage.
