Love has opened up the door.**


**A new day dawns, and new potential

Dear Friends

I'm sure you won't be surprised to hear that I am a fan of pancakes on Shrove Tuesday. To be honest I'm a fan of pancakes any time!! However, Ash Wednesday and the promise of being marked with mud on my forehead, at the start of Lent doesn't float my boat at all.



I have long been ambivalent about the things it is suggested we might do in Lent like giving up something we like. That can be a helpful spiritual practice which focuses the mind on deeper things like the whole area of sacrifice and its cost. However, too often it is merely a badge of achievement. Why not take up something which benefits others for instance, rather than avoid chocolate for six weeks and reap the benefits on your own waistline. Neither have I ever understood banishing the riches of God's wonderful world in the shape of flowers from the church during these Spring days. For those who find these practices (and others which I could mention) helpful that's fine but it is but one way of approaching the weeks before the most important of all Christian festivals, and preparing ourselves for Easter Day.

I'm always glad to join in conversation about why we do what we do, or why we don't do what we don't do for that matter, not least when it prompts me to learn or to develop my own thinking. This week the question was about Alleluia's in Lent – to be or not to be?

There are two penitential seasons in the church year, Lent (6 weeks) and Advent (4 weeks). They are to help us to prepare for Easter and Christmas, respectively, through self-examination, penitence, self-denial and study. It is clear to me that churches of all persuasions are much more ready to compromise on the penitential nature of what they offer during Advent than they are during Lent. For example, think of the Nativity service, Christingle and Carol Services which have a celebratory tone rather than one of penitence, and take place during Advent to general approval.

So, let us turn our attention to the 46 days of Lent. Wait a minute you say surely there are only 40 days in Lent. Quite so! (although google it and you will find it is a little more complicated than that). If you do the mathematics, you will discover that counting from Ash Wednesday to Holy Saturday there are 46 days. Christians have been forbidden to fast and do other forms of penance on Sundays (or sabbath days) for centuries in all denominations. Remove the six Sundays and you arrive at the 40 days of Lent representing the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the wilderness. Each Sunday acting as a mini-reprieve from the fasting and penitence of the Lenten season. However, in Lent we have both the penitential season of Lent and the liturgical season of Lent running alongside each other though they are not quite the same thing. In liturgy we loosely speak of the first to sixth Sundays **in** Lent but that causes confusion when we are considering the penitential season of Lent which, as I said, excludes Sundays.

The Bible tells us that, *If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness. 1 John 1: 9*

That to me suggests an imperative of confession but also implies a swift response to our honest confession. So, I wonder what we gain by drawing out the practice of repentance and forgiveness for a period of 40 or more days. It feels to me like a human imposition rather than the expectation of a loving heavenly father.

There is a sense in which every Sunday is a resurrection Sunday, including those in Lent, with Easter Day being the most holy and special resurrection Sunday of them all. When we talk about movies we recommend to friends we are careful to avoid ‘spoilers’. Our weekly ‘Easters’ spoil the penitential mood but we cannot unknow what we know for *The joy of the Lord is our strength Nehemiah 8:10*. When the Jewish people returned from Babylonian exile and were rebuilding Jerusalem’s walls, Ezra read the Law of God to the people, and they were deeply convicted of their past disobedience, leading to weeping and mourning. However, Nehemiah and the Levites encouraged them not to grieve but to rejoice, saying, “This day is holy to our Lord. Do not grieve, for the joy of the Lord is your strength” That joy is rooted in God’s forgiveness, restoration, and faithfulness, which transforms sorrow into strength and motivation to continue in obedience. Divine joy empowers, sustains, and strengthens believers, providing resilience and courage beyond what we might think is humanly possible.



In that joy and the wonder of our sins forgiven surely we will rejoice, crying praise be to God or in other words ‘Hallelujah!’ Although in some churches the tradition is that Alleluia is not said during Lent this is their tradition rather than a law. Perhaps it is worth noting that the Bible is silent about the customs that have been adopted by the churches around Lent – both the ones we conform to and the ones we ignore!!






The local foodbank relies on your goodwill and support.

Over 90% of the food distributed by foodbanks in the Trussell Trust network is donated by the public – that's why your food donations are absolutely vital to their ability to give everyone referred to them a balanced and nutritious three day supply of food.

A Rocha UK's Easy Eco Tips for March, April and May 2026

MARCH Take part in a local litter pick or beach clean during The Great British Spring Clean (Friday 13-Sunday 29 March), the nation's biggest mass-action environmental campaign. Litter picking benefits the environment by removing rubbish that can be hazardous for wildlife and helps bring people together. See if there's a litter pick in your local area or consider organising your own - after church on Sunday or with a youth group for example. Pray for your local area as you do the litter pick and ask God for opportunities to share why you are doing it. Find out more and pledge to pick up a bag at keepbritaintidy.org/our-work/eliminating-litter/great-british-spring-clean

APRIL Celebrate new life this Easter and have a go at growing something! April is the perfect time to try to grow something edible or, if you are a seasoned gardener, to encourage someone else to try. Salad leaves or herbs are a great place to start and will reduce your reliance on those oh-so-convenient supermarket salad bags. For indoor space, try 'micro-greens' (vegetable leaves harvested soon after they open) For greenhouses, try sowing salad leaf seed mixes. For outdoors, beetroot, lettuce, onion and pea plants are frost-resistant so can all be planted outside in April. As you sow, thank God for the opportunity to grow food, and pray for those communities that are facing food shortages and famine.

MAY Support pollinators. Nothing says Spring like the buzz of a bee! But these precious pollinators are declining due to habitat loss, climate change and agricultural intensification. Wednesday 20 May is World Bee Day, so look around to see how you can improve habitats for bees and other pollinators. Read more about bees, butterflies and habitats that support them in our Target 25 resources at A Rocha.org.uk/what-we-do/target-25. Sow a pollinator friendly seed mix, make or buy a bee hotel, let some wild flowers grow in your garden, and don't use pesticides. Pray that our pollinator populations will increase.
